Dear Friends in Christ,

What if—this is a crazy idea—church buildings are the tomb of Jesus? Could it be that the institutional church has domesticated Christ for its own purposes? Jesus started out as a radical, reformist rabbi, whose God burst the confines of Pharisaic Judaism. It could not hold this God. But I wonder if any church, any system, any theology, or any institution can ever hope to enclose all of Jesus. I am reminded of these words from Carl Jung (a pastor's son): "It often seemed to me that religious precepts were being put in place of the will of God—which could be so unexpected and so alarming—for the sole purpose of sparing people the necessity of understanding God's will."

I personally think this is very good news (i.e., Gospel). Jesus will always elude the leashes we try to put him on, he always turns out to be more than we are ready for, he calls us beyond all our little pieces of truth toward a greater freedom, a newer growth, a better way. Churches can be tombs for Jesus, ideas can, doctrines can, rules and regulations, our prejudices definitely can—but the Easter Lord bursts forth from all the mausoleums we built for him, he rolls away every gigantic stone of human short-sightedness and desire to control God.

Does this mean Church is bad, institutions are evil, ideas are prisons and we should dispense with them? Not at all! We just need the humility and the honesty to see our own limitations. We are all fragile, finite, mixed-up beings, we're easily confused and we way too easily believe ourselves and absolutize our own ideas, but we need ideas, we need Church, we need institutions. We just need to know that God is bigger and that we can never enclose God, understand God, control God, possess God (and yet God gives himself, herself, God-self to us unstintingly, so we do possess what we can never, ever possess).

So I need a Church, I need my ideas and my beliefs, and I will probably fall for them too much—hook, line and sinker. But Easter Sunday comes to remind me that Christ will burst every tomb, every prison, every idolatry. The Easter Jesus walks through doors, but

eats fish. The disciples wonder—"Is it he?" Their hearts burn within them.

I want my heart to burn within me. I want to experience the *mysterium tremendum* that makes me go all weak in the knees because I'm realizing that life is so much bigger than I had thought. I want the God who beckons me to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. I can never control or contain this God, but he takes my hand and he leads me, his love supports me, his Truth guides me, even if I can only grasp glimpses. And then a miracle—I too come forth from tombs, I too receive new life, God enfolds me in his love and I rise up to a bigger life. In his death, I die; in his Easter, I rise!

## Council Meeting Summary

February 11, 2008

### **Christ the Servant Lutheran Church Council**

*(The complete version is posted on the CTS hall bulletin board.)*

- ♣ **Financial secretary's report:** When pre-paid amounts are excluded, the monthly budget for pledge income is \$11,591. The amount received for January was \$11,320. Loose plate/facility usage budgeted income is \$700; the amount received in January was \$1,063.
- ♣ **Treasurer's report:** We had a positive balance of \$526.53 for January.
- ♣ **President's notes:** Council is looking for a person to replace Doreen Foge as Financial Secretary. Joyce also reminded Council that there will be 4 council vacancies in May: Dave Larrabee, Roger Rasnake, Mike Mayer and Jo Johnson. Sandy D'Angelo informed the Council that she would resign at the end of May because of personal reasons. Joyce asked Council members to consider recommendations for members to fill these positions on Council.
- ♣ **Property:** Council discussed the need to reassign/reconfirm church cleaning responsibilities; the number of persons actually cleaning the church seems to be shrinking. Joyce will ask Dave (who was not in attendance) to have the congregation confirm their commitment to the church cleaning area each signed up for, and to appeal to the congregation to take on more responsibility for church cleaning. Time and talent sheets in May will have a separate page for church cleaning sign-ups.
- ♣ The Footnotes deadline for the April Footnotes was set as March 14 so that Joanne would be free for Holy Week.

## About Worship

### On Christian Worship: Flowers



Christ was not indifferent to the splendor “of the lilies of the field” (Matthew 6: 29). The Church fears no extravagance in the worship of God, devoting the best of her

resources to expressing wonder and adoration in God’s presence. Humble and fragile though they are, the flowers and greens of the earth can be counted among the resources of the praying Church. The person who prepares flowers for the sanctuary and church participates in that careful preparation of “the large upper room” (Mark 14: 15; Luke 22: 12) commanded by Jesus before the Last Supper.

Outside of Lent, flowers may be placed near, but not on, the altar, ambo and crucifix. During Advent the floral decoration of the altar should be marked by sobriety and restraint; it is not yet time to express the joy that comes with Christmas. During the Paschal Triduum it is fitting to flower the paschal candle and baptismal font. Arranging flowers for the Sacred Liturgy requires skill and a joyful willingness to enter into the rhythms of the Church’s calendar, “Bless the Lord, all things that grow on the earth” (Daniel 3: 76).

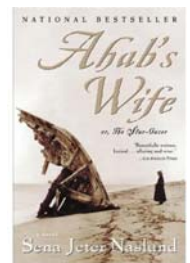

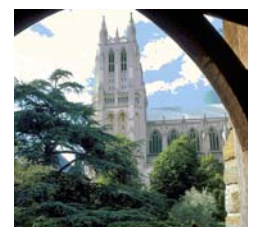

## Forest Oak Film Buffs for March:

### “Amazing Grace,” Sunday, March 2, 5:30 p.m.

“Amazing Grace,” based on the life of antislavery pioneer William Wilberforce, is directed by Michael Apted (*The World is Not Enough*, *Coal Miner’s Daughter*) from an original screenplay written by Academy Award nominee Steven Knight (*Dirty Pretty Things*).



The film stars Ioan Gruffudd (*Black Hawk Down*), Albert Finney (*Erin Brockovich*), Romola Garai (*Vanity Fair*), Michael Gambon (*Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban*), Benedict Cumberbatch (*Hawking*), Rufus Sewell (*Legend of Zorro*), Ciaran Hinds (*Rome*) and introduces Youssou N’Dour.

Executive Producer is Jeanney Kim, with Mark Cooper as co-producer. Producers on the film are Terrence Malick (*The Thin Red Line*) and Ed Pressman under their Sunflower Productions banner, Patricia Heaton and David Hunt for FourBoys Films, and Ken Wales.

Gruffudd plays Wilberforce, who, as a Member of Parliament, navigated the world of 18th Century backroom politics to end the slave trade in the British Empire. Albert Finney plays John Newton, a confidante of Wilberforce who inspires him to pursue a life of service to humanity. Benedict Cumberbatch is William Pitt the Younger, England’s youngest ever Prime Minister at the age of 24, who encourages his friend Wilberforce to take up the fight to outlaw slavery and supports him in his struggles in Parliament.

Elected to the House of Commons at the age of 21, and on his way to a successful political career, Wilberforce, over the course of two decades, took on the English establishment and persuaded those in power to end the inhumane trade of slavery.

Romola Garai plays Barbara Spooner, a beautiful and headstrong young woman who shares Wilberforce’s passion for reform, and who becomes his wife after a whirlwind courtship. Youssou N’Dour is Olaudah Equiano. Born in Africa and sent as a slave to the Colonies, Equiano bought his freedom and made his home in London, where he wrote a best-selling account of his life and became a leading figure in the fight to end the slavery of his fellow countrymen.

## Gaithersburg HELP Needs Volunteers and Food Donations

- *Food Coordinators* are needed to schedule food clients. Requires working from home one weekday a month, returning client phone calls and entering client records on their laptop computer.
- *Transportation Volunteers* are needed to drive clients to weekday medical appointments in the local area. Flexible position; assignments can be accepted or rejected based on the volunteer's availability. Approximate time commitment is 2 hours per month.
- *Transportation Coordinators* are needed to arrange rides for clients. Requires working from home one week every other month returning client phone calls and contacting volunteer drivers. Generally takes 1-3 hours each weekday spread throughout the day.
- *Pantry Workers* are needed to prepare and distribute food packages to clients at the pantry. Requires a time commitment of 3 hours one weekday a month in the late afternoon or evening.
- *Leaders* are needed to serve on the Executive committee monitoring the overall operation of HELP and developing long-range plans.

### *Current non-perishable food needs:*

Canned spaghetti sauce with meat (26.5oz); cereal; canned chicken; instant potatoes; canned fruits; boxed rice mixes; pastas; diapers; and large paper grocery bags. Bring donations to church.
