Dear Friends in Christ,

Context is everything! I am writing this pastoral letter on my first day back at regular work routine after a week-long retreat at St. Anselm's Abbey. Since the abbey is on 60 wooded acres in the midst of a busy city, it was interesting, when Dave picked me up, to leave the peace, sanity and attentive focus on life of the monastery and drive into the maelstrom of traffic, noise, anger, hurry (to nowhere), and insane busyness that is D.C. I was reminded of these words of Carl Jung:

Reforms by advances, that is, by new methods or gadgets, are of course impressive at first, but in the long run they are dubious and in any case dearly paid for. They by no means increase the contentment or happiness of people on the whole. Mostly, they are deceptive sweetenings of existence, like speedier communications which unpleasantly accelerate the tempo of life and leave us with less time than ever before. *Omnis festinatio ex parte diaboli est*—all haste is of the devil, as the old masters used to say.

Parish churches are not Benedictine abbeys, but I like to think that they have, *mutatis mutandis*, a similar role. They are to be counter-cultural places of prayer, recollection, and focus on what life is really for in the midst of the insane clawing after power and money that secular life so often reduces life to. They are also to be places of hospitality, compassion, and community in our world of human moral meltdown.

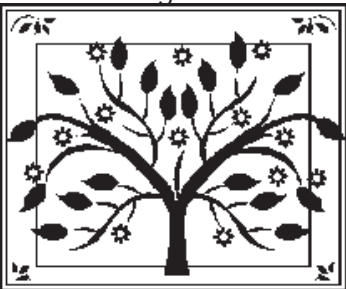
I am thankful for Linda's ministry among us—calling us to the life of spiritual growth. I am thankful for daily prayer and for Eucharist on the calendar days (not just Sundays) of the Church. When most of the Parish Council shows up for Evening Prayer before the Council meeting, I feel we have started the meeting in the right place.

I am thankful as well for all of you who help CTS be a place of mercy in a ruthless world: all you who work at Gaithersburg HELP, all who have delivered meals to homeless people during shelter week or via McKenna's Wagon, or volunteered with SHARP, or

But as we get caught up in the pace of life and the struggle to survive, we can forget what life is really for. CTS, and every parish church everywhere, exists to remember, to be a place where people remember to be human.

## Council Meeting Summary

April 14, 2008

### Christ the Servant Lutheran Church Council

*(The complete version is posted on the CTS hall bulletin board.)*



- **Financial Reports:** Income received for the five Sundays in March was \$12,650, \$1,059 over the monthly income goal. For the month our budget income exceeded expenses by \$3,304.97. Overall our income for the first quarter exceeded our budget goal by \$983.50. Expenses are running under budget. This gives us a positive balance of \$3,141.38 after the first quarter of the year.
- **Vice President's notes:** Tony Kerlavage conducted the meeting since Joyce Backus was unable to attend. Tony's focus was on the agenda for the Annual Meeting on May 4. Agenda items for the meeting are Council elections, Time and Talent presentation, a presentation on the Sharp program by the site director, Renime Fleury, and possibly a presentation on Habitat for Humanity. Tony also reminded the council that their annual reports were due to Joyce on April 20.
- **Business Administration:** Steve Garvey advised the Council that we have a security issue at CTS. Renime Fleury, the Sharp site director, discovered a man in the basement early one morning in mid-March. Since that time an attempted break-in has been noted (police were called about the intruder and the attempted break-in) and there have been several instances when the basement door in the youth room has been found unlocked. Volunteers from council have agreed to make security checks on nights when there are meetings at the church since this is when there is an opportunity for someone to enter the building and hide.
- **Parish Care:** Jo Johnson expressed concern over the quality of food offered at food banks like Gaithersburg HELP and Manna, particularly the lack of fresh fruit or vegetables. She suggested that the congregation bring fresh fruit or vegetables for the offering one Sunday each month. Steve Garvey advised her that HELP cannot accept fresh items due to the lack of proper storage facilities. Jo said that she would contact Manna about their facilities. *[Please see related article on page 6—ed.]*

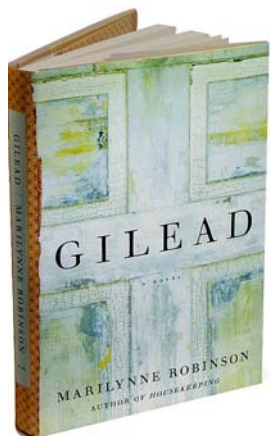

## About Worship

### On Christian Worship: The Kyrie Eleison

“God has made him both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified” (Acts 2: 36). The Kyrie Eleison (Lord have mercy) is a litany addressed to the risen and ascended Jesus. Acclaiming him as both Lord and Christ, we implore his mercy. Though most often prayed in English, the Kyrie Eleison may also be sung or recited in the original Greek, the only bit of Greek that has survived in our Western Liturgy. The Kyrie Eleison is a cherished reminder of the prayer of the Eastern churches who in their liturgies ceaselessly call down the mercy of Christ.

The Kyrie Eleison may be sung by the people responding to a cantor or to a choir. Over the centuries it has been clothed in every variety of musical vesture. Some of these melodies emerge from the depths of a great sorrow; others express a quiet repentance and hope; still others soar ecstatically in praise of Christ’s triumph over sin and death. “Lord, have mercy, Christ, have mercy, Lord, have mercy.” A prayer for all times and places. Even the simplest chant can serve to imprint it upon the heart.

### CTS Book Club for May

*Gilead* by Marilynne Robinson, May 25 in the Parlor, 7:00 p.m.

In 1956, toward the end of Reverend John Ames’s life, he begins a letter to his young son, an account of himself and his forebears. Ames is the son of an Iowa preacher and the grandson of a minister who, as a young man in Maine, saw a vision of Christ bound in chains and came west to Kansas to fight for abolition. He “preached men into the Civil War, “ then, at age fifty, became a chaplain in the Union Army, losing his right eye in battle. Reverend Ames writes to his son about the tension between his father—an ardent pacifist—and his grandfather, whose pistol and bloody shirts, concealed in an army blanket, may be relics from the fight between the abolitionists and those settlers who wanted to vote Kansas into the Union as a slave state. And he tells a story of the sacred bonds between fathers and sons, which are tested in his tender and strained relationship with his namesake, John Ames Boughton, his best friend’s wayward son.

This is also the tale of another remarkable vision—not a corporeal vision of God but the vision of life as a wondrously strange creation. It tells how wisdom was forged in Ames’s soul during his solitary life, and how history lives through generations, pervasively present even when betrayed and forgotten.

### New CTS Fresh Pantry Program!

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

PBS recently aired a Bill Moyers special pertaining to food and hunger issues, which included information on the plight of American food pantries.

With food prices rapidly rising and ever higher demand for food pantry services straining the already strained pantry network, funding is limited, pantry donations are down, and fresh food items are meager, rare or, in many cases, non-existent. Most food boxes that are given out to individuals and families in the community contain high-salt, low-nutrition canned goods and some high in carbohydrate/sugar pastas or cereals. The food may keep someone from going hungry, but does not offer many health benefits. With more and more elderly people with medical conditions using food pantry services as well as families with young children, the need for fresh, healthy foods is great and growing.

We here at CTS can help, in our small way, to provide healthy, fresh fruits and vegetables to those in our community who are in need by partnering with MANNA Food Center, which provides the bulk of food pantry services throughout Montgomery County. MANNA is currently providing 2,100 individuals and families with food boxes each month. The Director of Food Collection advised me that the need for pantry services has risen 21 percent since January of this year and the need is continuing to grow.

So we are launching a new program at CTS called **First Sunday Fresh Pantry**. We are asking parishioners to bring in a bag of fresh fruit or vegetables (list of acceptable items will be posted in back hallway), on the first Sunday of each month. Containers will be provided in which to place your donations. Children and youth are also challenged to bring in an apple or orange (or more) in a baggie as their own personal donation. We will then either take the produce directly to the MANNA walk-in refrigeration unit or MANNA will pick up the donations. Once we get our program off the ground, and it is successful, we will challenge the other churches in the county to follow our lead. This could result in fresh produce donated on first Sundays, second Sundays, etc., and eventually grow to provide a sizeable and varied array of fresh fruits and vegetables for distribution in monthly food boxes.

More information about this program will be discussed at the May congregational meeting. Together, all of us at CTS can make a difference!

Sabbath is not only about rest; it is about reveling in creation. By eliminating the distractions of our own creating and working, we can begin to be fully present to this wondrous creation of God's. Several people have told me that they are not good with being still or silent, or feel uncomfortable with the notion, and have therefore refrained from attending a quiet morning.

Let me dispel some myths and misconceptions:

- There are very few people I know who can totally clear their mind and be still for hours. Those who can do so have been practicing a lifetime.
- You are not expected to stay in one spot for three hours.  
We have the sanctuary, lounge, and grounds at our disposal; wherever the Spirit leads you in silence, you are free to wander.
- You are not expected to pray constantly for three hours.  
You may feel led to journal, meditate, ponder, pray, write prayers, read devotionals, or sit in quiet contemplation—the only requisite is to maintain silence for the prescribed time.
- I will have a booklet of quotes, prayers, and scriptures for you to use if you want something upon which to focus. There are also Bibles available. You may bring your own spiritual reading to delve into and meditate upon; many of us need tools to help us focus.
- You may bring your own prayer beads, mandala, finger labyrinth to help focus your mind and spirit. You may also bring your own yoga mat if yoga postures are what help you focus.

I have Anglican prayer beads and Rosaries available for use if you wish to "try on" a new discipline.

Do not let the silence intimidate you. Move beyond your comfort zone and experience the Divine in a new, and perhaps refreshing, way.
