Dear Friends in Christ,

As we come back to the regular parish schedule after the summer break, I always think it is useful to remind ourselves as to why we are doing all this, why we are Christians. Church is not the point of Church—that is Churchism, not Christianity. Jesus is not the point of Jesus—that is just superstition. The real point of Jesus is God—Jesus wants to reveal to us the nature of God so that our lives can be renewed. For Jesus, the “nature of God” is not a theoretical issue—it is sheer pragmatism. We have been worshipping the wrong God and the result is that we have become the wrong people. God, for Jesus, is an instrumental issue. God is the pathway to life.

Sister Maria Jose Hobday gets this. To ask “who should I worship” is just a way of asking “how should I live?” She finds us falling short of the glory of God. She does this out of her ministry among Native Americans: “I would say that basically almost all Indian tribes that I know value hospitality over possession. Now I’d say that’s a principle that you need to think about. Most Native American people feel that the most difficult thing American people have to work with is something in their blood that wants more than they need whether other people have anything or not. Greed is another word for it...”

Perhaps this is why Jesus insists that you cannot serve God and money. They are rival deities. Both want our utter devotion. As soon as money becomes God, people become commodities and everything gets messed up. We can live without a qualm with our wealth while children starve. If children are starving while our garbage cans are full, it is probably a matter of a false God in our lives. That’s the prophetic message. Jesus goes beyond prophetic indignation, however, to a concern for us as well as for those starving children. Jesus sees that the rich and the full are starving too. They are suffering from spiritual malnourishment. The ONE campaign, the Millennium Development Goals, is a campaign for the welfare of us all.

The Roman poet, Ovid, once said “Cherishers are cherished.” Moving from a possession ethic to a love ethic saves us all. Those we cherish with our help get to survive and grow, but we also benefit—

I look forward to working with you again this year on proclaiming Gospel. We point ourselves and our lost and lonely culture to the worship of the true God, the God called Love, in whom we live and move and have our being. This God will recreate us, save us, fill us with life. What a great adventure we are called to in something as ordinary sounding as a parish schedule!

About Worship

On Christian Worship: A Place Where Beauty Is At Home

In celebrating the Eucharist through the ages, the Church has felt the need to be a place where beauty is at home. The architecture of basilicas, cathedrals, and churches attests to something more than a concrete need for space and shelter. The altar is more than a table and the ambo is more than a bookstand. Our churches and their furnishings bear witness to the mystery of faith and to the eucharistic amazement that rises in the adoring heart.

The beauty that is the work of human artisans raises the mind and heart to the author of all beauty and, in some way, says, "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give him thanks and praise." The humblest chapel and the poorest church become the theater of a lavish love when Christians, seized by the gift of the Eucharist, seek to respond to it with the work of their hands. The cleanliness of the church, altar, sacred vessels, linens, and other appointments is an indispensable expression of grateful love for Christ.

Architecture, sculpture, and painting not only express the mystery; they impress it on our senses, and through the senses, on our souls. Candles and incense, flowers and fabrics are the outward signs of an inward awareness of what Christ the bridegroom ceaselessly offers to his bride the Church in the Sacrament of the Eucharist.

- Financial—At the half-way point of the year, year-to-date spending is under budget and we have a positive balance (income exceeds expenses) of \$305.61. Pledges that are paid monthly or weekly tend to be slow in coming in this time of year. The designated flower fund is still running a deficit. Doreen will send out a reminder letter.
- Two major outreach ideas were discussed:
 - Film Buffs for September: “Green—the New Red, White and Blue” as movie: to plan to make it open to the public as we did “An Inconvenient Truth.”
 - The annual CTS Yard Sale: To make the event bigger, with music (Gapfillers?), food, etc.
- Council Policies: Steve reminded Council that the policies have to be reviewed annually. A copy was given to each member of Council and were reviewed and discussed.
- Dave Larrabee discussed replacing the doors to the shed. There was discussion about the feasibility of replacing the entire shed. Dave will research this and report back to Council in August.

Watering Notice

A change has been made to encourage and facilitate the usage of our outdoor water spigots by members interested in watering our trees and plantings and in other outdoor maintenance.

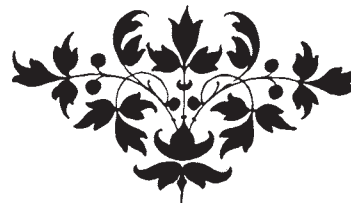
1. Spigot handles have been removed to a dedicated hook in the utility closet. Inside water valves, difficult to find and hard to reach, had been left in a "closed" position, are now in an "on" position.
2. To operate an outside spigot, obtain a handle from the utility closet, place it on the spigot to "mate" with the square post, and turn on the water. No tool needed. When finished, turn off the water tightly at the spigot, and return the handle to the hook in the utility closet. Leave the hose attached to the spigot. It is essential that this whole procedure be followed faithfully if this system is to work satisfactorily from spring through the fall, after which the inside valves will be closed.



With no handles available on the outside spigots, it should discourage water wastage and possible water vandalism by unauthorized others, when no one is around.

Three of them are part of the "A First Look At..." illustrated series by Pat Thomas, a British psychotherapist and counselor, and each of which, in addition to the reassuring narrative, asks the young reader questions and presents the adult with some useful guidelines and additional resources.

My Family's Changing—A First Look at Family Break-Up (J 306.8) explores the issue of divorce, always reassuring the child.

Stop Picking on Me—A First Look at Bullying (J 302.3) helps the child deal with the fears and worries raised by this unsettling experience.

I Miss You—A First Look at Death (J 155.9) is a simple but realistic exploration of a child's feelings and questions about this sensitive subject.

In addition, Maria Shriver's fictional book, *"What's Heaven?"* came about as she faced questions from her children and other young relatives at the time of her own grandmother's death.

All of these small books are in the Juvenile section of your library. We thank the donors for these gifts.

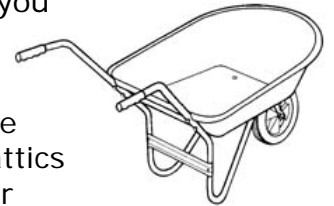

Faith Talk: Confirmation at Home: This fall we will be studying the Apostle's Creed. Let's start with the First Article: "I believe in God the Father Almighty, creator of heaven and earth." What does this mean? You can find Luther's explanation in The Small Catechism (which can be found in the back of the ELW!), but I'd like you to talk about what this means for you. Use these as conversation starters: "I believe that God has created me..." "I believe that God has given me..." "God provides me with..." "God also protects me ..." "God does all this because..." "In response, I..."

Chi Rho 2007: In July, Michelle, Jonathon and Albert, along with Barbara and Tony, joined 48 other Metro DC Synod youth and adults participating in Chi Rho – Metro DC Synod's weeklong servant event for Senior High Youth. We traveled to Neon, KY to work with HOMES (Housing Oriented Ministries Established for Service), a non-profit organization that provides affordable housing for low-income families through the use of government grants and volunteers. Working on two demolition sites, we removed over 30 tons of debris and burned 10 dump-truck loads of wood. We provided 1,800 hours of sweat equity, which, combined with our participation fees, provided over \$30,000 for future HOMES projects. Sunday Mornings

Except for Advent and Lent, when Pastor Bastien will be teaching the 4th–6th grade Sunday School class, he will be the regular teacher at adult forum. This year in the fall term, we will continue our reading of the Book of Joshua. Following that, we will continue our examination of Christian history by looking at the lives of the important Christians honored in the Lutheran commemoration of the Saints. We will work through the saints commemorated during the month of May. Then, we will begin what will be a monumental undertaking, a close reading of the Gospel of St. John.

Forest Oak Film Buffs

On the third (or sometimes the second) Sunday of each month, at 5:30 PM, lovers of film gather to watch a movie together and then to discuss its meanings. Everyone brings finger food to share.
